PROJECT SPOTLIGHT

The Florida Chapter of the Wildlife Society sponsored two students, Hailee Quintero (2022 Recipient, and recent UCF graduate) and Lentil Evergreen (2020 Recipient, and recent FAU Honors College graduate), to attend the Southeastern Section Field Course held May 26-June 10, 2022, in Georgia. One of the students, Hailee, sent us this short summary of her experience.

The two weeks I spent at the Jones Center in Ichauway for the SETWS field course were magical and transformative to say the least. Driving into the 30,000 acre long-leaf pine reserve, I felt like I had entered another world entirely! Dr. Daniel Greene and Dr. Mike Conner, among many others, made sure this course was worthwhile and I can't thank them enough for such an incredible experience. During our two weeks stay, we covered many things including but not limited to: small mammal trapping, owl & hat surveys, radio telemetry with quail, necropsies, and we even participated in a prescribed burn! We then used our accumulated skills to create a group project covering the data we collected.

Throughout the SETWS field course, I made so many connections with professors and professionals from all over the country while learning about their careers, some of which I had no idea existed beforehand. It was so refreshing to be surrounded by likeminded people that have the same passion for environmental conservation and to learn from one another. This experience truly rekindled the fire within me towards a career in conservation and made me hopeful for my future. Most of the material covered were things I never learned in my undergrad and getting to bridge the gap between the online classroom, due to COVID-19, and practical application was such a rewarding experience.

Finally, I would like to thank Monica Folk and the FL chapter of TWS for sponsoring me; it was an honor to participate in this field course and I will surely never forget my time spent in Ichauway!

The first day of the workshop consisted of excellent presentations by various drone experts from UF/IFAS Extension (several counties), UF Wildlife Ecology Dept, FWRI, Northern Arizona University, Leading Edge Aerial Technology, Florida Forest Service (FFS) and Wildlife Drones (based in Australia). We learned about UAS regulations, types, data collection and management and specific applications for herbiciding, prescribed burning, imagery collection, and monitoring wading birds, manatees and seagrass restoration. The presentations (PDF or video format) are available to registered participants (free) or members interested in the topic who could not Zondervan (Maria Zondervan@fltws.org) or Tyler Pittman

The second day of the workshop was based at the Boyd Hill Nature Preserve a few minutes south of the hotel. We had great field demonstrations of quad UASs by FFS and Triad Drones, including post-field processing of various imagery types by Triad. Mark Cunningham gave an excellent presentation on the history and status of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza in Florida. We ended the day with a tour and presentation of some of the dozen or so educational Birds of Prey located at the Preserve. Great meeting and Workshop! Thanks to all the organizers, presenters, hosts and participants!

2022-23 FLTWS Undergraduate Student Scholarships

The Florida Chapter of The Wildlife Society is sponsoring two undergraduate scholarship opportunities for wildlife-interested students. The Greater Everglades Student Memorial Scholarship and the Diversity Wildlife Student Scholarship will award \$1,500 each to a Junior or Senior in wildlife or biology. The diversity award is for a student who identifies with minority status, including but not limited to, a racial, ethnic or gender identification.



Students enrolled in programs at HBUs, private, community colleges, Native American programs or alternative institutions are encouraged to apply for the diversity award.

To be eligible for one of these scholarships, students must be pursuing a career in wildlife management or ecology and be supportive of the mission of The Wildlife Society. Students must also be currently enrolled in a college or university in Florida and have a cumulative GPA of 2.5 or greater. Recipients will be selected based on financial need, extracurricular activities, demonstrated leadership, professional potential, personal challenges and achievements, and career goals, as stated in the student's letter.

Candidates should submit the following items before 1 December 2022:

1) A letter expressing professional goals and financial need; 2) a resume or CV; 3) copies of transcripts from each college or university attended (unofficial copies are acceptable); 4) one letter of recommendation submitted directly from a faculty member or wildlife professional.

Students applying to the diversity scholarship should submit a separate essay on the topic of the applicant's minority status (can take the form of a reflection), which should express how selection of the candidate would increase equality and inclusivity in the field of wildlife study.

2022-23 FLTWS Graduate Student Scholarship

The Florida Chapter of The Wildlife Society is sponsoring the Courtney A. Tye Memorial Graduate Student Scholarship. This scholarship is for graduate students during the 2022 -2023 academic year. One \$2,000 scholarship will be awarded. This scholarship is intended to assist a graduate student who has demonstrated potential for making a future professional contribution in wildlife science or management through research, management, education, or outreach.



To be eligible for this scholarship, the applicant must be a full-time graduate student at a college or university in Florida and have an interest in a career in wildlife ecology or management. The recipient will be selected based on contribution of their graduate research to wildlife in Florida, their demonstrated leadership, professional preparations, and need for the funding.

Each candidate must submit the following 5 items to apply:

- 1. A letter describing your professional career goals in wildlife ecology or management, your preparations for a career in this field, your previous or current involvement with TWS, and an explanation of how the funding would be used if awarded;
- 2. A resume or CV;
- 3. A <u>one-page document</u> describing the nature of your graduate research, your role in developing the project, what stage the research is in, and an indication of how the project is funded;
- 4. A completed assessment submitted directly by your major advisor (see accompanying form).
- 5. A letter of recommendation submitted directly by your major advisor. This letter should specifically address how the student and their research will advance wildlife research in Florida, the potential of the student to contribute to the wildlife profession, communication skills, competence, motivation, leadership potential, involvement and work ethic.

To be considered for this scholarship, all application materials must be emailed (preference) or sent through postal mail post-marked on or before 1 December 2022.




Figure 1. Graph showing the longevity of FLTWS memberships as of September 1, 2022.

Prescribed Fire for Wildlife

We are pleased to announce the date and location for Florida's 2023 Prescribed Fire for Wildlife class. Our sponsors for this class are the Florida Chapter of The Wildlife Society and the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission. This class has been designed for Florida land stewards and wildlife biologists who use prescribed fire as a land management tool, to provide information on how prescribed fire is essential to maintain key Florida wildlife habitats and how it may be used to enhance or restore lesser quality habitats. Our overall theme for this class is "Incorporating Wildlife Values in Prescribed Fire Planning, Ignition and Evaluation".

Our 2023 class will be at the FFA Leadership Training Center located at 5000 Firetower Road, Haines City. The training center is located east of Haines City on the east shore of Lake Pierce. It is surrounded by Catfish Creek State Preserve and other nearby natural areas. The training center and nearby natural areas provide an ideal venue for this class which relies on a combination of classroom sessions and field exercises, led by experienced wildlife biologists and prescribed burners. Field exercises will allow student groups an opportunity to develop plans to apply classroom knowledge to the landscape.





The Big Cypress Fox Squirrel (BCFS, Sciurus niger avicennia) is a state-Threatened member of the rodent family found in South Florida, south of the Caloosahatchee River. BCFS are omnivores feeding occasionally on insects or eggs, but primarily eat seeds, nuts, or fruit. While the climate of South Florida is conducive to breeding year-round (which they will) there are peaks in breeding from November to February, and April to July. Being primarily a ground-dwelling species, they prefer habitats with an open understory such as cypress domes, pine flatwoods, or hammocks, but will readily use human-dominated landscapes like golf courses, parks, or neighborhoods. The most prominent threat to BCFS is the loss or fragmentation of habitat due to development or conversion to agriculture, as well as degradation of habitat from the suppression of fire. Because they are state protected, regulations and protocols exist for environmental permitting and land use changes. For more information, visit MYFWC, or USFWS.
